WHAT WE DO

Unarmed Civilian Protection (UCP)

UCP refers to the use of unarmed civilians to directly protect civilians by preventing, reducing, and stopping violence through **deterrence** and **encouragement**.

UCP relies on dialogue, relationships, realtime analysis and understanding with all stakeholders including armed actors to effect changes that reduce violence and protect civilians.

HOW DOES UCP WORK?

PROTECT

Unarmed civilians, nationals and internationals, providing direct protection to civilians under threat of physical violence without resort to weapons.

SUPPORT

Supporting local civil society organizations and communities to better protect themselves build peace, and prevent further outbreaks of violence.

BUILD

Strengthening the capacity of existing protection mechanisms and local peace structures to sustain peace.
